Chartiers Street Widening and South-end Bridge Construction Update

PENNDOT is planning a three-week closure of Chartiers Street which will begin on October 21st. However, several factors could impact the start date. PENNDOT will be putting out an official press release when their schedule is finalized.

Additionally, the first of three extended weekend closures of the South-end bridge over Chartiers Creek is expected to begin on November 10th and will reopen on the 14th. The second extended weekend closure for the bridge is tentatively planned for November 17 through 21. The third extended weekend closure for the bridge deck overlay may need to be postponed to next year due to weather concerns.

During the Washington Avenue Bridge extended weekend closures, a pedestrian shuttle will operate from 6:30 a.m. to 10 p.m., Friday through Monday. Shuttle stops will be located at the intersection of Washington Avenue and James Street and Route 50 and Millers Run Road/Washington Pike. Designated shuttle stops cycle times are not expected to exceed 30 minutes.

Once completed, this project will include a new seven-lane bridge over Chartiers Creek, a widened Chartiers Street with dedicated turning lanes, and a widened on-ramp to northbound I-79 to carry traffic from Chartiers Street.

our new plan that is on track to be
completed by summer 2023.

Borough Council recently awarded a \$1,202,877.20 contract to A. Merante Contracting, Inc., for the Werner Street and Union Street landslide stabilizations. The Werner Street project, caused by severe erosion and a lack of storm sewers on a roadway that was built adjacent to a very steep slope, will repair the sections of

roadway that slid down onto and are endangering the Pittsburgh & Ohio Central Railroad tracks. This roadway is a prime access route for accessing the public parking lots in the Bridgeville Central Business District. This project will construct a retaining wall, install storm sewer infrastructure, and restore the roadway; thus, preventing any future damage or danger to the adjacent railway and will ensure unfettered access to the Bridgeville Parking Authority main public lots off James Street. Similar retaining wall construction and roadway repairs are planned for the second landslide on Union Street. To help finance this project, the Borough has received a \$500,000 grant from the County and \$514,004 in federal Recovery Act Funding that will be used towards these projects. Construction for both projects is planned for this winter.

Made possible by a \$272,000 grant from the State, the playground equipment at both Cook School and McLaughlin Run Parks will be upgraded next year. This work is in addition to the new playground that will be built in the spring at Chartiers Park. Since January, the Borough Council has secured \$1,574,570 in grants to help improve our infrastructure, parks, sewers and public safety.

Working in partnership with officials from Bethel Park and Upper St. Clair, Bridgeville Borough has been awarded \$350,200 from ALCOSAN to make improvements to reduce sewer overflows in the McLaughlin Run watershed. The project will include repairs to and rerouting of the multimunicipal sanitary sewer line on Baldwin Street, a section of new sewer added and repairs on New York Street and multiple sewer lining work throughout town to reduce rainwater infiltration. The engineering design for this project is now in the process of being completed and construction is planned for 2023.

Actions of the last Borough Council Meetings

July 11, 2022 The Council:

- Awarded a \$114,019 contract to Westmoreland Electric Services to upgrade lighting within Chartiers Park (work to be performed in the spring).
