Members of Council and Mayor,

This report will summarize activity since our last meeting.

CAPITAL PROJECTS:

- See attached detailed Project Update Log. Updates for the month are noted in red font.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE:

- Grant Projects (Grant Log Attached):
 - Federal Appropriation in the amount of \$750,000 has been secured and included in the 2024 Federal Budget by Senator Bob Casey and Senator John Fetterman for the McLaughlin Run Flood Control Project Phase 1A. With this funding, the project is 100% funded at the Engineer's estimate for the project!
 - The Borough was awarded a \$248,780 CFA Multi-Modal Grant for the Gregg Avenue Steps Project – a project identified within the Active Transportation Plan.
 - Grant application seeking \$102,500 to replace and upgrade Chartiers Park Shelter No.1 has been submitted to PA DCNR. Letters of support for the project have been received from Senator Robinson, Representative Kulik, Bridgeville Library and the Bridgeville Athletic Assoc.
 - Attended Grant Workshop sponsored by Senator Robinson on March 12th.
 - Assisting the Fire Department with a grant application for a project that would replace the fire station roof and resurface the parking lots.
- Insurance Claims / Matters:
 - The Safety Committee met on March 21st. No incidents for the month to report. The committee also discussed Employee Wellness Program activities.
 - Completed and submitted renewal application for the Police Professional Liability Insurance.
 - 2024/2025 Public Art Bridgeville Outdoor Sculptures have been insured and added to our policy.
- 2024 Borough Guide completed and mailed out.
- 2nd Quarter Newsletter is currently being drafted and will be mailed out with trash bills mid-April.
- New resident packets sent to all new home buyers for the prior month, information based off real estate transfer records.
- Responded to three Right to Know Request seeking Building Permit log records, storm sewer maintenance records and rental property registration records.

- Represented the Borough at the annual meeting of the Chartiers Valley District Flood Control Authority on March 21st.
- The Volunteer Opportunity Calendar has been created by Cheryl Glowark and posted on the Borough website. Information on the program has been provided to Bridgeville nonprofits.
- Attended with the President of Council the Route 50 multi-municipal meeting on March 13th.

CODE ENFORCEMENT / ZONING / PLANNING:

- Detailed Zoning / Code Enforcement report attached summarizing complaints, permits and affairs.
- Attended the March 25th Planning Commission Meeting.
- Kalkeruth Roofing & Sheet Metal Land Development Plan – Developers Agreement and Stormwater Agreements have been executed and received. Solicitor will be recording the documents.
- Vesper Corner Plan of Lots Re-subdivision Plan – coordinated application, plan reviewed by the Borough Engineer and Planning Commission. Provided to Allegheny County waiting on their response.
- Zoning Hearing Application for off-street parking variance at 621 McLaughlin Run Road has been received and fully processed. Hearing scheduled for April 17th, 7PM in Council Chambers.
- Comprehensive Plan:
 - April 8th, 6:30PM Public Hearing has been advertised and posted.

PUBLIC WORKS:

- McLaughlin Run Flood Control Project Phase 1A:
 - Easement documents provided to all property owners along project limits.
- Coordinated electrical repairs to Washington Avenue streetlights on March 25th, joint project between DPW, Westmoreland Electric and West Penn Power.
- The new Utility Truck should be received in the next two weeks, all title documents have been completed and processed.
- 2023 Sanitary Sewer Lining Project – bid opening held on March 19th, lowest bid received was from Jet Jack in the amount of \$360,150. This project will address many areas where infiltration was found in the system from CCTV data of the prior year.

PUBLIC SAFETY:


- Station Street (between Railroad and Washington Avenue) No Truck Prohibition that the Borough requested to PENNDOT has been posted, signs went up on March 18th.
- As directed by the Public Safety Committee, the application to study a jake-brake prohibition on McLaughlin Run Road has been submitted to PENNDOT.
- Following up to complaints about mosquitos in the Chartiers Creek Back Channel near St. Clair Street, contact has been made with Allegheny County Health Department's Vector Control Unit. They will be baiting this area this month for mosquitos and will reevaluate mid-summer.

PARKS AND RECREATION:

- Cook School Park Tree Planting was held on March 30th. Approximately 30 volunteers attended and planted 17 trees that were made possible through a grant from Tree Pittsburgh.
- Attended March 23rd Easter Egg Hunt that was moved to the Fire Station due to poor weather. The event worked out better there than at Chartiers Park.
- Playground Improvements Project – met with the contractor on March 18th, he hopes to have the work at Cook School completed by early April and McLaughlin Run Playground complete by May 10th.
- 2024 Park Improvements Plan has been prepared, reviewed with the DPW staff and Parks Committee. Staff is now working to address the items listed in the plan.

If anyone would like to discuss any issue independently, please do not hesitate to contact me. I will also be prepared to discuss with the group at our upcoming meeting.

Casey Delivers Major Wins for Pennsylvanians in Second Half of 2024 Government Spending Bills

MARCH 23, 2024

In second wave of FY24 government funding bills, PA Senior Senator advances child care funding, support for law enforcement and border patrol, and initiatives to uplift workers and small businesses

Additionally, Casey secures \$30 million for 60 Pennsylvania community projects

Bill heads to President's desk to become law

Washington, D.C. – Today, U.S. Senator Bob Casey (D-PA) announced that several provisions he advocated for have advanced through the Senate as part of the second wave of government funding bills for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024. These include funding for law enforcement and border patrol, investments in child care programs and higher education, and initiatives supporting small businesses and Pennsylvania workers. Additionally, Senator Casey fought to secure funding directly for 60 community projects in Pennsylvania, totaling \$29,959,000.

"I'm fighting to ensure that when Pennsylvanians send their tax dollars to Washington, Congress invests it right back into their communities," said Senator Casey. "Through this bill, I've worked to tackle some of the most pressing issues facing Pennsylvanians—from supporting our first responders and stopping the flow of fentanyl into our communities, to revitalizing communities and uplifting small businesses, to investing in the high quality child care and public education that working families deserve."

The spending package, passed 74-24, includes six of the 12 funding appropriations bills needed to pass to fully fund the government and continue critical programs. The legislation includes numerous priorities important to Pennsylvania in the following categories: defense and national security, public safety and securing the border, education and child care, health care, and supporting workers and small businesses, and more. The House of Representatives passed the bill on Friday. Now that it has cleared the Senate, it heads to President Biden's desk for his signature.

Direct Community Project Funding across Pennsylvania

Senator Casey secured \$30 million for 60 projects across Pennsylvania. The projects include job training initiatives, education programs for K-12 and college students, flood mitigation measures, small business support, and health facility improvements in the Commonwealth. Examples of projects include:

- **Investing in Flood Prevention in Harrisburg:** Senator Casey secured \$750,000 for Harrisburg's Redevelopment Authority to complete the preliminary engineering and design for its Paxton Creek Dechannelization Project, which will reduce the repetitive and damaging flooding of Paxton Creek.
- **Supporting Community Schools in Erie:** Senator Casey secured \$350,000 to fund four community schools in Erie. Continued investment in these community schools will ensure that the more than 2,000 students served receive robust academic, medical, and emotional supports critical to overcoming systemic barriers to success.
- **Upgrading Medical Equipment and Technology at an LGBTQ Health Center in Philadelphia:** Senator Casey secured \$400,000 to upgrade critical basic medical equipment and technology infrastructure at the Mazzoni Center, which provides comprehensive health care for Philadelphia's LGBTQ community. The upgrades include bolstering security systems, upgrading vitals machines, replacing outdated technology, and purchasing a generator which will ensure critical medications do not spoil during power outages.
- **Investing in a New Emergency Services Facility in Schuylkill County:** Senator Casey secured \$2 million to help Schuylkill County construct and operate a new facility which will provide expanded training for volunteer fire companies, emergency management services, and law enforcement officials.
- **Supporting Opioid Addiction Treatment and Recovery in Johnstown:** Senator Casey worked in partnership with Senator Fetterman to secure \$115,000 to support the Cambria County Drug Coalition's efforts to administer medication and harm reduction supplies, as well as connect people suffering from substance abuse disorder to health services. This unit would help a lower income community address the overdose crisis and supporting community revitalization. Senator Casey secured this project in partnership with Senator Fetterman.
- **Supporting Tree of Life's Antisemitism Awareness Efforts:** As Tree of Life expands its mission to fight antisemitism across Pennsylvania and the Nation, Senator Casey secured \$1,000,000 to give the organization the resources to develop and

Project Title: Bridgeville Flood Control Project

Recipient: Borough of Bridgeville

Amount: \$750,000

County: Allegheny

Project Description: This project will reduce the risk of flooding in Bridgeville by removing and replacing the Commercial Street culvert, which will improve storm drainage in the Borough. Senator Casey secured this project in partnership with Senator Fetterman.

Project Title: Business of Childcare Training Program

Recipient: Center for Women's Entrepreneurship—Chatham University

Amount: \$157,000

County: Allegheny, Butler, Beaver, Westmoreland

Project Description: This project will help expand Chatham University's Business of Childcare Training program beyond the City of Pittsburgh to nearby counties and will help launch a program to help small child care businesses navigate post-COVID regulations.

Project Title: Donora Family Medicine Renovation in Fredericktown

Recipient: Centerville Clinic

Amount: \$500,000

County: Washington

Project Description: This project will support renovations to create a new medical clinic for Donora Family Medicine, a part of Centerville Clinics, Inc. The Clinic's current facility is beyond repair and inadequate for the needs of medical professionals and patients.

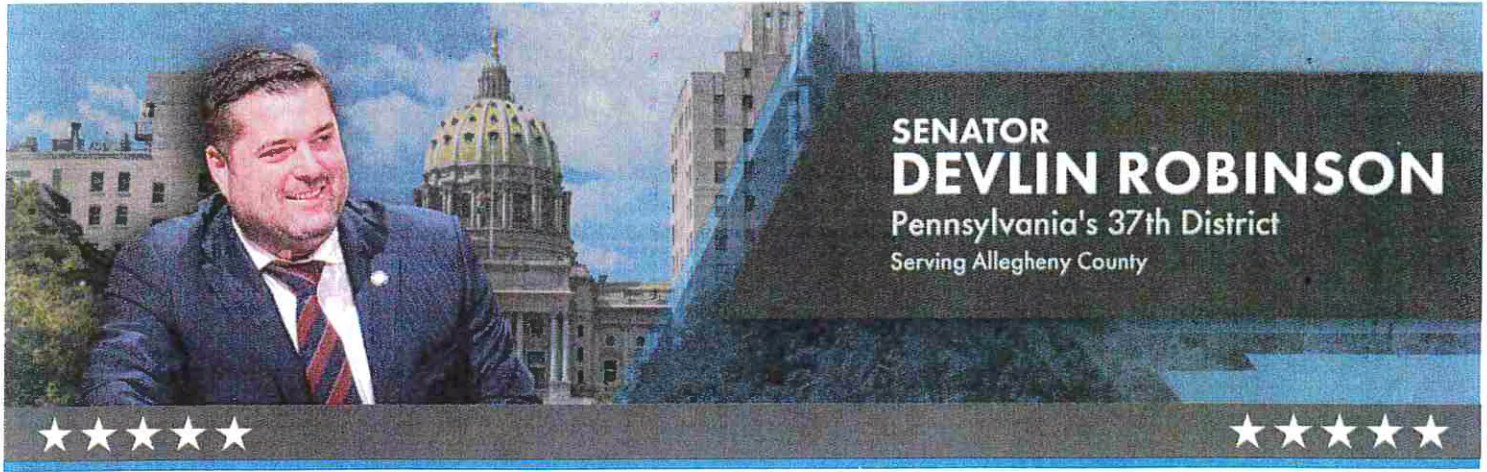
Project Title: UMWA Career Centers, Inc. Transitioning Workers in PA from Coal to Manufacturing

Recipient: United Mine Workers of America Career Centers, Inc. (UMWA Career Centers, Inc. UMWACC)

Amount: \$1,500,000

County: Greene

Project Description: The project would help the United Mineworkers of America (UMWA) Career Centers, Inc. provide recruitment, retraining, and placement for workers from rural coal mining communities in Pennsylvania, helping them transition from traditional coal jobs to manufacturing jobs. Senator Casey secured this project in partnership with Senator Fetterman.



Robinson Secures More than \$2.3 Million for District Infrastructure Upgrades

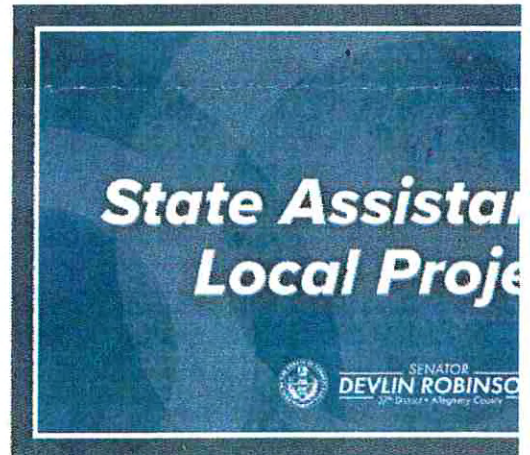

HARRISBURG – [Sen. Devlin Robinson \(R-37\)](#) announced today that more than \$2.3 million in grants is being awarded for local transportation improvement projects in the district.

“These initiatives are truly remarkable. They will enhance connectivity by revamping streets, renewing public stairways, improving sidewalks and more,” said Robinson. “Each of these projects will significantly enhance pedestrian experiences within our district, providing convenience and safety for residents and visitors alike, as they enjoy the diverse amenities and support local businesses across different areas of our community.”

The grants, awarded through Commonwealth Finance Authority’s [Multimodal Transportation Fund](#) are to encourage economic development and ensure that a safe and reliable system of transportation is available to the residents of the commonwealth. These projects include:

- \$300,800 to replace the West End Stairway in Moon Township.
- \$249,900 for Crescent Township to replace sidewalks on McGovern Boulevard.
- \$127,400 to install sidewalks on six streets in Leet Township.
- \$456,516 to the Borough of Coraopolis to reconstruct two blocks of Montour Street.
- **\$248,790 for Bridgeville Borough to construct a new public stairway and bicycle tunnel at Gregg Avenue.**
- \$163,463 to Thornburg Borough for sidewalk installation along Hamilton Road.
- \$500,000 for transportation improvements by Friends of Pittsburgh Professional Soccer at the Sports and Athletic Complex at Montour Junction in Coraopol
- \$262,500 for Upper St. Clair Township for the construction of a sidewalk along Fort Couch Road.



Multimodal Transportation Fund awards may be used for the development, rehabilitation and enhancement of transportation assets, streetscape, lighting, sidewalk and connectivity of transportation assets and transit-oriented development.

The CFA was established in 2004 as an independent agency of the [Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development](#) to administer the commonwealth packages.



MONTHLY REPORT – APRIL 2024

- Weekly street sweeping started on April 2nd and will run through May 3. May through September, streets are swept the third full week of each month.
- Spring Brush Collection started April 2nd and runs through May 3rd.
- Business District Maintenance:
 - Streetlight Outage between James Street and Station Street was repaired on March 25th. A contractor had to be brought in and coordinated with West Penn Power to temporarily disconnect service while the service line was cleaned and repaired.
 - Troop banners have been hung for the year, including the new second poles that the Parking Authority requested.
- Park Maintenance:
 - All park facilities, restroom buildings, pavilions and concessions have had water service restored for the season.
 - Cleaned up Chartiers Park for the Easter Egg Hunt.
 - Swapped the larger bleachers that were at Cook School Park for the smaller ones at Chartiers Park and moved the larger ones from the soccer-field over to the baseball field.
- Storm-sewer Improvements: four catch basins on Laurel and Coolidge Streets have been fully replaced. All storm sewers on streets that are scheduled to be paved this year are in the process of being fully rebuilt or replaced.
- Equipment Maintenance:
 - Serviced multiple police cruisers (oil changes and brakes)
- Sign Maintenance – replaced damaged signs, straightened poles, refaced faded stop signs and added missing speed limit signs throughout town.
- Ongoing maintenance has been dedicated to filling potholes and repairs to multiple streets and alleys.
- Cleaned & maintained culverts, trash-rack, catch basins and swales throughout town specifically on and after rainy days.
- Foreman responded, marked, and reported multiple PA-One Call requests.

Bridgeville Public Library goes out into the community with monthly outreach visits to local daycares and elementary schools, as well as our annual March Battle of the Books programs at Chartiers Valley Intermediate and Middle Schools.

The library has established an ongoing partnership with Chartiers Valley Middle School, providing them with a "lending library" of books that the students can check out and take home to read. We also collaborate with 8th grade English teacher, Amy Bouch to host an Open Mic Night and 2 Sentence Horror Story Competition for the students.

The library took part in a number of community events this year, such as Day on the Avenue and Winter Blast, spreading the word on the programs and services that the library has to offer. With the help of the Friends of the Library, we also participated in the Rotary's annual Chili Cook-Off.

Children's Programs



The Bridgeville Public Library serves as a center for lifelong learning while also aiming to strengthen the bonds of the community. This starts in the library with storytimes designed to help develop early literacy skills for our youngest patrons. Last year, we also were able to reach out to our community with Baby Bags, which were made possible through an ACLA program funded through grants from the Grable Foundation and the Pittsburgh Foundation. We created 150 bags filled with board books, manipulatives such as shaker eggs and scarves, early literacy tips, and links to songs on our YouTube channel. We also included Family Resource Pages with a plethora of information about resources through Allegheny County based on information from PAKeys' Project Launch, and Developmental Milestones information from The Children's Institute. These bags are currently available at the library for families of little ones ages two and under, and we also provided a supply for the Bridgeville Area Diaper Bank to distribute.

We also offered a variety of programs that were fun and educational for school age children. From book clubs and STEM programs, to art and DIY, to the return of Puppy Tales, where kids can practice their reading fluency by reading to Oreo, a licensed therapy dog. We also offer monthly Bookworm Bags, which are mystery bags filled with books that can be checked out and contain activities for kids.

This summer in particular we built community connections through weekly programs that feature visitors from My Favorite Sweet Shoppe, Brentwood Bank, Lori Allen Dance Center, Chartiers Valley Primary School, and ended with a visit to the Bridgeville Volunteer Fire Department.

Whether it's attending a Family Fun program at the library or visiting our permanent StoryWalk at Chartiers, the Bridgeville Public Library provides opportunities for engaging learning experiences for kids of all ages, both in our physical building and in our community.



Tween & Teen Programs



Last year, we held weekly tween and teen programs. These included Tweentastic, Teen Hangouts, and D&D Club. Attendees participated in activities such as using 3-D pens, crocheting, and the role-playing game Dungeons and Dragons. These programs served as an opportunity to teach the tweens and teens new skills, and in the case of D&D, collaboration and team-building.

We strengthened community partnerships with special collaborations such as a Scavenger Hunt with Upper St. Clair Library, Chocolate Dipping with My Favorite Sweet Shoppe, and a Black Light Paint Night with South Fayette Township Library.



Bridgeville Public Library participates in a county-wide Teen Discord server, which offers teens a safe space to connect and have fun with their peers. On the server, Teen Librarians across the county host monthly game night programs such as D&D.

Our vibrant Teen Volunteer Program saw teens assisting with a number of tasks. Teens helped our programmers during events such as Family Fun Cooking 101 and Beautiful Oops. They also helped us in the library with tasks ranging from preparing program materials to counting board game pieces. In addition, the teens completed online volunteer opportunities such as video editing, creating graphics for our monthly digital bookshelves, and creating graphics for our in-library TV slideshow.

Adult Programs



Bridgeville Public Library develops programs for adults with the goal of providing educational and enriching programs for all. By providing access to ideas and imagination, the library serves as a cornerstone of its community.



Last year, we held weekly, bi-weekly, and monthly ongoing events, such as Chess Club, BYOB Game Nights, Movie Matinees and Craft Nights. These events were designed to foster a sense of community and give adults a chance to practice creativity and use skills such as strategic thinking.



In addition to these ongoing programs, the library worked with community partners to offer monthly special presentations on topics ranging from Hands-Only CPR to Solar Observing to Irish Folktales.

The library also hosts an Adult Volunteer Program. Volunteers help us with tasks such as shelving, dusting, and pulling items on the paging list.


From attending Chess Club to a speaking event, to volunteering, the library provides ongoing opportunities for engagement and learning throughout the year.
