Borough Council Adopts 2025 Budget without Tax Increase

The Borough Council has approved its 2025 Budget without raising taxes. The \$8,129,344.78 budget maintains the millage rate set in 2018 and focuses on significant improvements in various areas, including parks, public safety, and public works. Key highlights of the budget include:

- The start of Phase 1A construction of the McLaughlin Run Flood Control Project.
- A \$336,000 allocation for road resurfacing, expected to repave at least three streets.
- Active Transportation improvements, including the reconstruction of the Gregg Avenue steps and installation of bumpouts on Bank Street.
- Consulting services for a downtown zoning ordinance amendment based on the Comprehensive Plan.
- The purchase of a mini excavator for the Public Works Department to assist with sewer repairs and maintenance, and the replacement of a police cruiser.
- Investments in the Sanitary Sewer System, including pipelining, stormwater infiltration repairs, and cleaning/inspection
- Increased contributions to the Bridgeville Library, Bridgeville Volunteer Fire Company, and SouthBridge EMS.

Safe pedestrian-friendly neighborhoods are a priority for a walkable community such as Bridgeville.

Many ask, whose sidewalk is it anyway? Many residents and business owners are confused about who is responsible for taking care of the sidewalks in front of their homes, offices and stores. As a result, people who are required to clear snow and otherwise maintain those sidewalks are sometimes unaware of their responsibilities. Even though it's not technically on your property, property owners are responsible for maintaining sidewalks that abut their property. This includes making sure there are no tripping hazards or serious defects. If hazardous conditions are found, the abutting property owner is responsible to repair and or replace the sidewalk slab.

Congratulations to Chief of Police Chad King who retired on January 3rd after 26 years of service. We thank Chief King for his leadership and the positive impact he has made on our community.

With support from the State, the Borough received a \$102,900 grant that will be used to replace the main picnic shelter at Chartiers Park this year. This exciting project will include a new 32' x 50' pavilion, concrete floor, new picnic tables and utilities. It is anticipated to have this project completed by this summer.

Reconstruction of the Gregg Avenue public steps will be completed in the next couple of months. These steps connect Laurel Street to Gregg Avenue and Greenwood Place. This project will be completed by Avelli Construction and 70% of the costs are paid for by a State multimodal grant. It includes new steps, a bicycle runnel, handrails and a sidewalk connection to Laurel Street. Additionally, the Borough recently completed the construction of a large retaining wall and slope repair at the end of Bluff Street Extension to address a landslide that occurred there last year.

Thank you to the many volunteers who helped plant several trees at public areas last fall. This is the third community tree planting in Bridgeville where the trees were provided to the Borough at no charge from the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy. A spring planting is planned for sites on Baldwin Street and McLaughlin Run Park; stay tuned for a planting day and call for volunteers! These efforts are all part of the Borough's plan to create and establish a Shade Tree Commission in Bridgeville.

Actions of the last Borough Council Meetings

October 14, 2024 The Council & Mayor:

- Authorized the Borough Manager to apply for a grant to upgrade the field lighting at Chartiers Park.
- Announced that PA-DEP and Army Corps of Engineers permits necessary for the construction of Phase 1 of the McLaughlin Run Flood Control Project has been secured.
- Awarded \$68,000 contract to Edge AI Solutions for the 2024 Sanitary Sewer O&M CCTV Program.
- Donated \$4,000 to the Bridgeville Public Library during Love Your Library Month enabling a matching donation.

November 11, 2024 The Council & Mayor:

 Approved the Chabala Corner Plan of Lots lot consolidation plan on Ewing Avenue.

- Authorized the Borough Manager to apply for a grant to upgrade water drinking fountains at Cook School and Triangle Parks.
- Awarded \$99,000 contract to Independent Enterprises for the Bluff Street Extension Slope Stabilization and Retaining Wall Improvements Project.
- Awarded \$200,010 contract to Avelli Construction for the Gregg Avenue Stairs Project.
- Entered into Sculpture Loan Agreements with Seward Johnson Atelier for the 2025-26 Public Art Bridgeville exhibition.
- Authorized the repurposing of a Borough owned lot on Baldwin Street into a Butterfly-Pollinator Garden.

December 9, 2024 The Council & Mayor:

 Approved the retirement of Chief of Police Chad King effective January 3, 2025.

- Approved the Rogers Lot Consolidation Plan for property on Osceola Dr.
- Adopted the 2025 Budget without the need for a tax increase, set the sewer rate, trash collection fee and millage
- Authorized Mackin Engineers & Consultants to complete the Downtown Zoning Ordinance Update.
- Authorized the Borough Engineer to prepare plans and specifications to improve the crosswalk on Bower Hill Road at Commercial Street, and for the reconstruction of Shelter 1 at Chartiers Park.
- Reappointed both Deb Colosimo and Nicole Steck to the Bridgeville Parking Authority Board of Directors.
- Authorized the Public Safety Committee to administer the search for a new Chief of Police.
